COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with an understanding of the historical evolution of intelligence services and their impact on the conduct of international relations since the First World War. It will introduce students to conceptual and theoretical debates in the literature as well a variety of case studies in order to understand the role of intelligence in international relations. Those students who completed the course successfully will be able to discuss key intelligence concepts and explain how decision makers use intelligence for decision making as well as for framing their foreign policies.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to define the basic concepts, understand the key intelligence functions, demonstrate a working knowledge of the intelligence policy nexus challenges, understand the role of intelligence agencies in international relations and how decision makers use intelligence for decision making as well as for framing their foreign policies.

EVALUATION

There are three requirements for this course:

- -<u>Attendance and Class Participation:</u> Please note that attendance to all mandatory lectures (70% of the whole semester) is a requirement for being eligible for a grade on this course. Every student is expected to arrive on time and to be prepared to discuss the assigned readings.
- -Mid-Term Exam (50%): Students will be evaluated through a 3 hour exam. The questions for the exam will be based both on the course materials and class content.
- -<u>Final Presentation (50%):</u> Students will be evaluated through a 3 hour exam. The questions for the exam will be based both on the course materials and class content.
